### Swimming with FISH, by Charlene Fu

After many years of supporting FISH of Clarke County's food pantry with monthly donations of food, paper goods, and clothing, Good Shepherd Church has deepened this cooperation by joining FISH's latest initiative: FISH Community Table, a mobile food pantry that distributes food on Saturday mornings from a neighborhood location.

On Feb. 4, a dedicated group of about a dozen volunteers from Good Shepherd and FISH braved frigid temperatures to serve hot soup in the church kitchen and distribute boxes of food from the parking lot to residents of the Village of Pine Grove and Shenandoah Retreat.

Everyone who walked into the church building that morning was struck by the enticing aroma of the home-cooked beef and vegetable soup and Brunswick stew (made by Senior Warden Lois Tapscott and vestry member Judy Hall, respectively) that were available for eating in or take away. FISH's bounteous food boxes contained fresh eggs and milk; canned soup, vegetables and fruit; canned tuna and pouched chicken; and ground beef, potato flakes, flour, pasta, pasta sauce, peanut butter, walnuts, oats, yogurt and toilet paper.



It was FISH's sixth Community Table event, and the first time at Good Shepherd. The uncharacteristically cold temperatures in the low teens that morning kept many at home, but FISH vice president and pantry director Anne Cushman said, "We served 11 families, four we have never seen before, which says we are in the right place."

The Community Table started last fall and is Anne's brainchild. She wanted to reach those in need of FISH services who can't get to FISH's Main Street location in Berryville. When Blue Ridge Area Food Bank gifted FISH a box truck last year, the Community Table was born. With a representative from Clarke County Social Services on site at each Community Table event, county residents can also get administrative tasks taken care of if they are unable to get to the county offices during regular business hours.

On Sunday, Jan. 22, after Junior Warden Tim Hall preached his Epiphany homily, he invited Anne to share ways we can be lights to the world. Fittingly, the Gospel reading from which Tim had just preached was on Jesus calling the disciples to follow him and "fish for people." Anne spoke impassionedly about FISH's history and its mission and vision, and the unmet needs that she saw in the community that grew into the Community Table initiative.



At that point, FISH and Good Shepherd had agreed to the Feb. 4 Community Table date, but her inspirational talk was met with such an enthusiastic response that, within days, she asked if Good Shepherd would consider a monthly commitment. Our church members responded with a resounding and unhesitating "Yes."

As Anne and the Good Shepherd volunteers finished two hours of food distribution on Feb. 4, they agreed that the monthly event would commence in April, when the weather is more congenial and after FISH's box truck is converted into a refrigerated truck.

Meeting our neighbors in Pine Grove and helping to meet their needs has been a focus of Good Shepherd's outreach efforts, and it's been exciting to see how quickly this partnership with FISH came together. Pastor Henry Blackaby wrote in his life-changing and best-selling book "Experiencing God: Knowing and Doing the Will of God" that the key to finding God's will is to "Watch to see where God is working and join Him in His work."

FISH is a volunteer-led non-profit Christian ministry that, in cooperation with local churches, organizations, and private citizens, has, since its founding in 1968, been supporting neighbors with basic necessities of life such as food and clothing, financial assistance, and a fuller integration into our local community life.

Rev. Rob retired from Trinity, Upperville in 2018, after 11 years as their rector. Before that, he had served as priest for more than 20 years, as interim priest at St. Stephen's in Wilkinsburg, rector for St. Paul's in Mt. Lebanon, PA, and filled various roles in parishes in Wilmington, N.C.; Boise, Idaho; and Honolulu, Hawaii.

He is a graduate of Georgetown University and the Virginia Theological Seminary. His most recent "post-retirement" service was interim rector at Christ Church, Millwood, prior to Rev.
