Praying Through Winter, by Martha Clark

"The fruit and the purpose of prayer is to be "oned" with God in all things." ~ Julian of Norwich

Many thanks to all who participated in our three monthly Saturday morning *Praying Through Winter* gatherings. It was a joy for me to share what I have learned from my prayer teachers and faith communities over the years. I hope that you can step into the Easter season feeling stretched, uplifted, closer to God and neighbor, and ready to take new prayer practices into the Spring and Summer.

To 'pray with your whole being!' ...body, mind, heart, spirit... is always the invitation as we deepen our relationship with all that is holy; as we enter that intimate space with the One "to whom all hearts are open, all desires known, and from whom no secrets are hid."

This winter, we explored more of what it means to pray with our bodies, beyond words, through symbolic worship gestures of praise and adoration as well movement and physical poses that express our most deeply felt intentions. We learned the Body Prayer attributed to the Christian mystic, Julian of Norwich. We practiced simple asanas (poses) of Prayerful Yoga. We ended with a wonderful practice of Qi Gong led by Penni Tidwell.

We coupled movement prayer with an introduction to other ancient forms of monastic and contemplative prayer practices: Centering Prayer, Lectio Divina, Taize chanting, and Labyrinth walking. All these forms of prayer help lead to the sacred center within each of us, where we can find rest and renewal and foster communion with God.

For those who would like to continue (or perhaps begin) practicing the gestures of Julian's Body Prayer, comprised of four poses and intentions, here is a simple outline to follow:

The first pose, **Await**, is a posture of receiving, held with cupped hands extended at the waist to receive the presence of God.

The second pose, **Allow**, is a posture of opening, reaching up with the hands open to the coming of God's presence.

The third pose, **Accept**, takes in whatever comes, standing with hands cupped at the heart, head bowed.

The final posture, **Attend**, is assumed with hands extended and palms open in willingness to act on what has been given.

name of Jesus, continues to empower us to be God's agents of healing and transformation in our own lives, and in the world."


Parish Family News by Judy Hall

Congratulations to Josette Keelor on her new professional faculty position of Content Producer with James Madison University's Content Marketing Department. I must say it is intimidating to interview and write a story about a seasoned, professional reporter. It's obvious that she is very excited about this new job.

At JMU, Josette is bringing her newspaper skills of writing, reporting, editing, and proofreading to a new environment. She'll be working on *Madison* magazine, the *Madison* app, and the JMU website. One of the main differences is that she has more time to work on stories and proof magazine pages than she had at a daily newspaper. Recently, her team has been working on the Spring/Summer edition of the magazine, which they will

distribute around campus and to families and alumni in May. The magazine also publishes in the fall and winter, and Josette will spend much of the summer working on the fall edition -- writing feature stories, editing stories submitted by colleagues and students, and proofing pages.

Josette is one of five main people who edit JMU's stories, including two student editorial assistants; but many other staff members contribute to the process through photography and graphic design. Each magazine page goes through several reviews before the team will release the Spring/Summer edition. JMU's editors use The Associated Press Stylebook in addition to a smaller JMU stylebook, which both offer guidance on how to edit stories, headlines, and photo cutlines for punctuation, capitalization, grammar, and clarity.



Josette is enjoying working in a university atmosphere. Even though her office is downtown and off campus, she visits the campus often. In the coming weeks, Josette will be involved in selecting the new interns for this summer and next year. This is a great opportunity for students to learn job skills that will prepare them for their careers, and, in fact, many of Josette's coworkers are JMU alumni.

Like many white collar professionals, Josette is returning to the office after working from home the last three years. Currently her drive from Berryville to Harrisonburg is an hour and 20 minutes, but she can still work from home two days a week and has been reducing her drive, where possible, by staying with friends closer to Harrisonburg one night a week or renting the occasional Airbnb. Josette is finding constructive things to do during the beautiful drive, like listening to podcasts, books, or music, and has plans to try learning a new language.

We continued on Maundy Thursday with a delicious sacred supper in the parish hall followed by Rev Martha's homily, foot washing, and communion in the sanctuary. With
