

There were a few parishioners located in the splash zone who received a more substantial blessing.

We then moved onto a lovely service where Bishop Harris delivered a crowd pleasing and captivating sermon. There were numerous snippets to take away from the sermon. A few examples (paraphrased) are: (1) sometimes life is a journey of slow discovery; (2) there is no movie music to let us know what is about to happen; (3) sometimes Jesus is subtly and softly walking with us; (4) you never know who you will meet when you break bread with others.


